### **York County** Law Enforcement Club

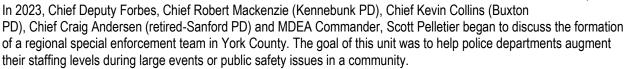


The York County Sheriff's Office, in partnership with RSU 57, is launching the YCSO Law Enforcement Club for 7th and 8th grade students (ages 13–14). The club will meet twice a month after school at Massabesic Middle School and provide members with opportunities to learn important life skills such as leadership. responsibility, integrity, and community service. Deputies will also introduce students to various

aspects of policing, including traffic stops, evidence collection, police K-9, Drone Demo, first aid/ CPR. and crime investigations. In addition, the students will be working on a community service project.

## **Southern Maine Multi-Jurisdictional Enforcement Team**







In June of 2025, the final policies were established, and the Southern Maine Multi-Jurisdictional Enforcement Team (SMMJET) was formalized. The following agencies are currently participating, the York County Sheriff's Office, Old Orchard Beach PD, Kennebunk PD, Kennebunkport PD, York PD, Sanford PD, Saco PD, Buxton PD, Kittery PD, and the Maine Drug Enforcement Agency. As stated in the SMMJET policy, this team will be used as a resource when a situation, event, or on-going matter has the potential to overwhelm a responding patrol force because of the scale, complexity, or duration of the situation or the need for specialized skills, personnel and/or equipment to better ensure the successful resolution of the incident.



The SMMJET team was immediately successfully utilized for two events. One was on July 4th in Old Orchard Beach for the annual fireworks show which draws thousands of people to the community. The large police presence proved to be a deterrent as there were very few arrests or issues. The team was then called out on July 11th, 12th, and 13th, at a weekend event at the Proving Grounds in Lebanon. Officers conducted high-visibility traffic enforcement outside the



event throughout the weekend to deter intoxicated operators from leaving the event. Once again, this operation was a huge success as there were no major traffic crashes or arrests throughout the











## Waterboro Bank Robber

Sentenced &

In August, Timothy Riley (42 years old from Gorham, Maine) was sentenced in U.S. District Court to 22 years in federal prison for his role in an armed robbery at a bank in Waterboro in June of 2024.



Riley admitted to brandishing a Glock Model 19 handgun when he entered the bank and demanded money. The resulting investigation, coordinated by York County Sheriff's Deputies, the FBI, and the Buxton Police Department, identified Riley and a second accomplice as being involved.

Riley's criminal history at the time of this incident included convictions for burglary, robbery, and a federal conviction for interfering with commerce by robbery. Based on these convictions, Riley was prohibited from being in possession of a firearm.

#### Stolen ★ Vehicle



In July, deputies responded to a home in Arundel for a report of a stolen vehicle. It was reported that a suspicious male was observed walking around in the neighborhood and had been asking for a ride prior to the vehicle being stolen. Coincidentally, a friend of the victim observed the stolen vehicle parked on Green St. in Biddeford. Deputies responded to this address and observed Travis Wakefield (35 years old from Lyman) walking away from the stolen vehicle. Wakefield was



arrested for Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle, Violation of Conditions of Release, Operating after Suspension, and Criminal Mischief. Wakefield was transported to the York County Jail where he was held without bail.

#### Suspicious Vehicle turns OUI



In August, Sgt. Morneau of the York County Sheriff's Office observed a vehicle traveling south on the Portland Road in Arundel with two flat right-side tires. Sgt. Morneau tried to stop the vehicle, however, it continued to travel another mile to a small business park where it finally stopped. The driver was identified as being Slavador Perron (44 years old from Biddeford). Perron was found to be intoxicated and failed field sobriety tests. Perron was arrested for OUI-Liquor and Failure to Stop for a Law Enforcement



Officer. Perron was transported to the York County Jail. He has two prior convictions for OUI, making this charge a felony. His bail was set at \$500, which he was unable to post.





#### Stolen Camper



In July, deputies completed an investigation involving a Michael Thurston (46 years old from Biddeford). Deputies had opened



an investigation a few months prior that alleged Thurston took possession of a subject's camper and sold it to another individual. Thurston was charged with Theft by Deception (Class C) and was being held at the York County Jail.

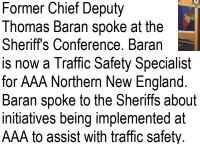

## Warrant Arrest Terince Belanger

In July, Sergeant David Chauvette and Deputy Levi Johnson of the York County Sheriff's Office responded to



a home on the River Road in Lebanon in an attempt to locate a Terince Belanger, age 39, from Claremont, NH. Belanger had warrants for his arrest for Eluding an Officer, Criminal Speed, and Operating without a Driver's License. They met with an individual fitting his description who provided a false name. It was confirmed this individual was in fact, Belanger, who was then placed under arrest. After placing Belanger in custody, deputies located a firearm, fentanyl, and crystal methamphetamine on his person. Belanger was transported to the York County Jail. Bail was set on the warrants at \$3000 cash. He was additionally charged with Possession of a Firearm by a Felon, Unlawful Possession of Crystal Methamphetamine. No bail was allowed on

- · Landry French: Supervision / Safety,
- Genex: Continue PVC wall panels in the bathrooms / locker rooms, working 3rd coat of mud and sanding, continued ACT ceilings / cut tiles, installing the interior doors on the 1st floor, hang drywall, mud/ tape the 2nd floor conference room.
- Palmer & Sicard: Continue overhead plumbing to the utility room, grills and diffusers in the office area. Continue installing bathroom fixtures on the 2nd floor.
- · E, S, B: Continue overhead rough in for power, fire alarm, data, security on the 1st floor, continue working panel tubs in both electric rooms, wiring the switch gear and ATS 1st floor electric room, started hanging light fixture on the building exterior, exit signs in the 2nd floor ceiling.
