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28 **1 PUBLIC COMMENT(S) ON ANY ITEM(S)**

29 Janet Drew addressed the Board via ZOOM and stated that she is interested in
30 hearing about the full- time Victim Advocate opening/hiring. Ms. Drew added that
31 it is important to know who the victims are.

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33 **2 TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE FOLLOWING MEETINGS:**

4 TO HEAR ANY REPORTS FROM THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Commissioner Dutremble informed all that the county convention is next week.

5 NEW BUSINESS

a. Introduce Archivist Paige Lilly to give report on Phase 2 –

County Manager Greg Zinser introduced Archivist Paige Lilly who explained to the Commissioners that she finished phase 2 in June 2023. She showed an outline (included as record of minutes) of items done and recommendations of things that needs to be done. Commissioner Clark asked what's left to be digitized? Paige Lilly replied all the microfilm 20 -30 rolls. Commissioner Clark asked what the cost would be to digitize the microfilm. Paige Lilly replied about \$150.00 to have the State Archives digitize the microfilm. She added that the county also needs to purchase a replacement for our microfiche reader.

*****CORRECTED COSTS SUBMITTED BY MS. LILLY AFTER THE MEETING*****

Estimated cost to hire Maine State Archives to convert black and white microfilm of the official Commissioners Court record books (both Court of Common Pleas and General Sessions of the Peace):

- Approximately \$180 for 4 rolls of the 8 books at the courthouse in Alfred
- Approximately \$ 900 for additional 19 rolls of 41 books in Augusta

The estimate is based on \$.04 per page and extrapolated from a rough count of total pages in the books at Alfred. (More microfilm exists for related books and case files, but we don't have a count on which to base an estimate.)

b. Discuss date and time for Spirit of America Awards ceremony

Recommend meeting in November, prior to a regular meeting

County Manager Zinser explained that the hope is that the new room will be ready. In the past we have held the ceremony at 3:00 prior to the meeting. We

can hold it either the first or third meeting in November. Commissioner

Chenette asked if it was broadcast? County Manager Zinser responded that he would have to go back and look. Commissioner Chenette replied that it is a nice

event so why not hold it during the meeting so people can see the recipients?

County Manager Zinser explained that we have the ceremony and then have a mingling period.

c. To set date to hear tax abatement denial appeal Hearing of Steve McLean of Limerick- suggested date of October 4, 2023

Commissioner Clark moved to hear the tax abatement denial appeal Hearing on October 4, 2023. His motion was seconded by Commissioner Andrews. Vote 5-0.

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- d. To review RFPs and bids and seek approval for back up dispatch center
County Manager Zinser explained that the bid received was in the amount of \$479,455.00. He continued that this process was completed in compliance with all Federal requirements and utilizes previously committed ARPA funds. Commissioner Ring questioned if this amount of money is within what we had previously requested? County Manager Zinser replied that it is. Commissioner Ring motioned to accept the bid of \$479,455.00 from Southern Maine Communications for dispatch terminals using our ARPA funds. Commissioner Chenette seconded the motion. Vote 5-0.
 - e. To authorize Sourcewell quote for two EMA drones.
County Manager Zinser explained this purchase will be funded by use of existing Federal funds through Homeland Security for our UAS team. The amount requested is \$12,512.00.
Commissioner Clark motioned to approve the purchase of the two drones in the amount of \$12,512.00 Commissioner Andrews seconded the motion.
DISCUSSION: Commissioner Ring asked if these drones are in addition to what we currently have or replacements? County Manager Zinser replied, in addition. Commissioner Ring asked if any additional training will be required (with the purchase of the two new drones)? EMA Director Art Cleaves explained that the current pilots are all qualified to use these drones. Vote 5-0.
 - f. To address e-mail communication- County Manager Zinser explained that this issue is reference to an e-mail communication from a resident for taking and retaining notes. He continued that this is part of the internal operations of the Sheriff's Office which is within the Sheriff's sole authority. The County Manager asked if the Commissioners would like him to respond as such? Commissioner Ring motioned that the County Manager reply to the resident as recommended by county counsel. Commissioner Chenette seconded the motion. Vote 5-0.
 - g. H.R. Director Corliss to seek approval of hiring/transfers of the following:
 - i. Andy Leary in the position of full-time Corrections Officer in the York County Sheriff's Office with an effective date of hire of August 7, 2023. Commissioner Clark motioned to approve the hiring of Andy Leary in the position of full-time Corrections Officer in the York County Sheriff's Office with an effective date of hire of August 7, 2023. Commissioner Andrews seconded the motion. Vote 5-0.
 - ii. David Temple in the position of reserve Corrections Officer in the York County Sheriff's Office with an effective date of hire of August 30, 2023. Commissioner Clark motioned to approve the hiring of David Temple in the position of reserve Corrections Officer in the York County Sheriff's Office with an effective date of hire of August 30, 2023. Commissioner Andrews seconded the motion. Vote 5-0.
 - iii. Ryan Succi in the position of full-time Corrections Officer in the York County Sheriff's Office with an effective date of hire of September 18, 2023. Commissioner Clark motioned to approve the hiring of Ryan Succi in the position of full-time Corrections Officer in the York County Sheriff's Office with an effective date of hire of September 18, 2023. Commissioner Andrews seconded the motion. Vote 5-0.
 - iv. Nicholas MacDonald in the position of full-time Corrections Officer in the York County Sheriff's Office with an effective date of hire of

149 Commissioner Clark motioned to approve the hiring of Nicholas MacDonald
150 in the position of full-time Corrections Officer in the York County Sheriff's
151 Office with an effective date of hire of September 18, 2023. Commissioner
152 Andrews seconded the motion. Vote 5-0.

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154 Commissioner Ring asked H.R. Director Corliss, with this hiring, how many
155 full-time Corrections Officers will we have? H.R. Director Corliss replied, 49
156 full-time C.O.'s. She added that all newly hired corrections officers are
157 scheduled to go the MCJA October class.

- 158 v. Meaghan McAvoy in the position of full-time Victim Witness Advocate in
159 the District Attorney's Office with an effective date of hire of
160 September 11, 2023

161 Commissioner Clark motioned to approve the hiring of Meaghan McAvoy in
162 the position of full-time Victim Witness Advocate in the District Attorney's
163 Office with an effective date of hire of September 11, 2023. Commissioner
164 Andrews seconded the motion. Vote 5-0.

- 165 vi. David Pratt in the position of full-time Civil Process Officer in the York
166 County Sheriff's Office with an effective date of hire of September 11, 2023
167 Commissioner Clark motioned to approve the hiring of David Pratt in the
168 position of full-time Civil Process Officer in the York County Sheriff's Office
169 with an effective date of hire of September 11, 2023. Commissioner Andrews
170 seconded the motion. Vote 5-0. Commissioner Ring asked if Mr. Pratt was
171 certified? H.R. Director Corliss responded, yes.

- 172 vii. John Willey in the position of part-time Court Security Officer in the York
173 County Sheriff's Office with an effective date of transfer of September 11,
174 2023

175 H.R. Director Corliss explained that this is a transfer of a current employee
176 into a newly funded position in the budget.

177 Commissioner Clark motioned to approve the transfer of John Willey to part-
178 time court security officer effective September 11, 2023. Commissioner
179 Andrews seconded the motion. Vote 5-0.

180 H.R. Director Corliss requested to add one additional candidate- She
181 explained that Faith Blanchette is a current reserve officer and has already
182 attended the MCJA and is fully certified. She would like to go full-time.
183 Commissioner Ring motioned to approve Faith Blanchette from a part time to
184 full time corrections officer effective September 18, 2023. Motion seconded
185 by Commissioner Chenette. Vote 5-0.

- 186 h. Discussion of Commissioners' meeting time

187 County Manager Zinser reminded the Commissioners that back in January they
188 voted to move the meeting time from 4:30 to 5:00. Commissioner Dutremble
189 requested that this item be put onto the agenda.

190 Commissioner Ring stated that she looked at all of the counties and only four
191 meet after hours. Most meet during the day, she informed all. Commissioner
192 Ring continued that she thinks a 6:30 p.m. or 7:00 p.m. meeting would be better.
193 Many of the selectmen meetings are at night and the Commissioners did the
194 same many years ago. She added that she doesn't think the 5:00 is helping or
195 the 4:30. If we aren't doing evening, then why not earlier in the day.

196 Commissioner Chenette stated that he wished to build upon what Commissioner
197 Ring has indicated. There are three months left in this calendar year and we are
198 going to change meeting time and then set it again in January. Why would we

199 make a change for three months, he asked? He stated that while he appreciates
200 Commissioner Dutremble's desire to circle back, we would now have to mark it
201 and advertise to let people know. Commissioner Chenette stated that his take
202 away from 4:30 to 5:00 it is that we need to make it later. Working Mainers
203 need it to be later. All I have heard is that it is better for staff. I did not hear
204 from any staff and also the staff did not elect us. I was elected by the people in
205 my district. I hope that we think about the working Mainers. In the past this
206 Commission has had a bit of apprehension for working Mainers. We should
207 value their contribution. Why would we make it harder for them? Other
208 municipalities' staff members attend. What department leaders have to be here
209 vs. what dept. leaders wish to be here?

210 We need to give them the option to participate, continued Commissioner
211 Chenette. If we are going to change a meeting time, he stated that he would
212 suggest changing the time in January and how we make it easier not harder for
213 them to participate. Commissioner Chenette stated that Cumberland County has
214 5:30 meetings but let's have that as a starting place.

215 Commissioner Clark stated that it was Commissioner Chenette's proposal that
216 we meet at 5:00. He continued that he doesn't see an increase in public
217 participation.

218 Commissioner Dutremble commented that it was a compromise he made to
219 make it 5:00 instead of 6:00. In January, he explained, we stated that we would
220 discuss this matter again in July or August so that is why he brought it back up.
221 County Manager Zinser asked that the Commissioners refrain from involving
222 the county employees in this discussion. It was not advanced by County
223 employees. We will do what is asked of us, he stated.

224 Commissioner Chenette addressed all and stated that he appreciated the other
225 Commissioner's comments. He asked what is the magic number that would
226 make this commission see the value in the public's voice? We have to give our
227 constituents the chance, commented Commissioner Chenette.

228 He said that he still had not heard of any arguments of any reasons why we need
229 to make it harder for people to participate .

230 Commissioner Chenette motioned to leave the Commissioners' meeting start
231 time at 5:00 Commissioner Ring seconded the motion. Vote 4-1 (Commissioner
232 Clark opposed).

233 234 **6 OLD BUSINESS**

235 a. Dredge Discussion with "Dredge Authority"

236 County Manager Zinser informed the Board that members of the Southern
237 Maine Dredge Authority are here to speak.

238 Kevin Roche addressed the Board and stated that they can't really proceed
239 without knowing how the operational structure (of the dredge authority) is set
240 up. He continued that they have a 501-3C set up and are working with the State.
241 They also have by-laws, Mr. Roche stated as well as a Board of Directors. He
242 stated that they are asking the Commissioners to approve one of three options
243 they have presented or one of their own.

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245 Commissioner Chenette thanked Kevin and David and asked them of the three
246 options is there a preference as to which would be most effective?

247
248 David Plavin replied that he believed either complete ownership by the dredge
249 authority or the county. One of the reasons we want the dredge authority to own

250 it, Mr. Plavin explained is that they could use the dredge as equity if they need
251 to get a loan.

252 Kevin Roche stated that in the spirit of us getting to the vote and until we are
253 ready, it sounds like the county wants to be on the Board so whomever you
254 decide, we would like to have a strong team. He added that they are ready
255 waiting for guidance and direction.

256 David Plavin added that they welcome Board participation and they appreciate
257 that the County bought the dredge. He added that a Board seat is guaranteed no
258 matter which option the Commissioners choose.

259 Commissioner Clark stated that he was under the impression from a letter from
260 our lawyer that we cannot give the dredge away.

261 County Manager Zinser informed all that there are a couple of issues that lead
262 us to seek guidance from the treasury. The guidelines for disposition of assets
263 are clear but we would refer you to the rules of disposition. He continued that
264 this tends to differ from some of the other projects (ARPA). Our preference was
265 to give you the money to purchase the dredge but there was no authority at the
266 time, explained County Manager Zinser.

267 We had to seek instructions from the Federal government that state a transfer to
268 a non-federal entity must be given and you must pay fair market value.

269 County Manager Zinser continued that it is questionable as to whether or not the
270 county or even you (dredge authority) can encumber the title.

271 The County Manager explained that he and others have been looking into these
272 issues and there are hurdles that we need to get over before we have ownership
273 discussions.

274 County Manager Zinser continued that most likely working out a lease
275 agreement would make the most sense but that he understood from Rick
276 Milliard, of the Southern Maine Dredge Authority Board that the Authority
277 needs to leverage the title and we can't do this.

278 Kevin Roche replied that the Commissioners vote was "the county will retain
279 ownership".... But the spirit was that you guys would retain ownership while
280 we set something up. If there is a way for us to retain ownership, that is a viable
281 solution, we should be able to operate on our own and have that asset, stated Mr
282 Roche. But, if we can't, hopefully we can work out something.

283 Commissioner Chenette asked if there is a particular timeline to have this
284 resolved to have operations for next year?

285 David Plavin explained that they do not have an executive director yet and that
286 they would feel more comfortable having a better understanding of the
287 ownership. He added that they are hopeful that you might have an answer for us
288 at your October meeting.

289 County Manager Zinser asked is there any possibility of some of the other towns
290 contributing some funding?

291 David Plavin responded that they might be able to do it but the problem would
292 be to have it equally applied.

293 Kevin Roche commented that they do have \$150,000 and that they think they
294 have found an outsourcing company that could staff the dredge.

295 County Manager Zinser asked them how they are intending to get the operation
296 going?

297 David Plavin said by leveraging the dredge(asset).

298 Kevin Roche added that they still have grant sources and that they have a third
299 party entity interested.

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Commissioner Dutremble asked if Saco was still on board as they were going to originally contribute \$710,000.00.

David Plavin explained that was for a whole year and that they are still supportive

Commissioner Dutremble advised that the County Manager has been working on this so let's everyone be patient.

Kevin Roche stated that they encourage the Board selection as they don't want the Commissioners to miss out on the first official Board meeting.

County Manager Zinser stated that this Board needs to give this some thought so we can discuss further at another meeting. My focus has been the ownership of the dredge. We are finding issues here with how we do this, explained the County Manager.

Commissioner Dutremble commented that perhaps they look at the information presented and talk about it at the next meeting.

County Manager Zinser added that maybe having a separate meeting with round robin conversations.

Bonnie Laughlin- (public audience member who did not wish to state what town she lives in) addressed the Board to give her support to keep the meeting time at 5:00 or later. She stated that there is a learning curve to meetings. Perhaps hearing from the constituents that you all serve only when one is worked up about an issue is what you feel happens, but I'd like to feel that there is a warm welcome to come forward. There are over 216,000 people in York County.

**AGREEMENT BETWEEN YORK COUNTY
AND
RSU 57**

"School Resource Officer"

This agreement EFFECTIVE the **15th** day of **August**, 2023 by and between the COUNTY OF YORK (HEREINAFTER REFERRED TO AS "York County" and Regional School Unit #57, a regional school unit formed pursuant to 20-A M.R.S. § 1461 *et seq.* (hereinafter "RSU #57 or the "District").

WITNESSETH

Whereas, RSU #57 is desirous of contracting with York County for school resource officer services (SRO services), including law enforcement services, which are more particularly described herein:

WHEREAS, pursuant to Title 30 A Section 452:

The sheriff in each county, in person or by the sheriff's deputies, to the extent the sheriff undertakes to patrol, shall patrol those areas in the county that have no local law enforcement but may not be required by law to patrol the entire county. The county commissioners, with the sheriff's agreement, may enter into a contract with a municipality/School District under section 107 to provide specific patrol services by the sheriff's department in return for payment for these services.

The Sheriff has the authority to assign a Deputy to RSU #57 and York County is willing to provide said SRO services. In consideration of the mutual promises by each party to the other and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which here by acknowledged, the parties covenant as follows:

1. SERVICES

- A. York County agrees, through the Sheriff's Office to provide to RSU #57 a SRO who is a fully trained deputy and a graduate of the Maine Criminal Justice Academy (MCJA).
- B. York County shall provide a SRO who shall participate in the School Resource Officer Program as outlined in a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the York County Sheriff's Office and RSU #57. The SRO shall provide law enforcement services as outlined in the MOU and consistent with the School Resource Officers Program. The SRO shall be subject to the terms of the York County Employee Personnel Manual, the York County Patrol Association Collective Bargaining Agreement, and the York County Sheriff's Office Policies and Procedures Manual. Any conflict between the terms of the MOU and this Agreement shall be governed by this Agreement. The MOU is hereby incorporated as an integral part of this contract as addendum 2.
- C. York County Shall provide RSU #57 with reports as outlined in the MOU.
- D. RSU #57 agrees that the SRO may leave duties assigned pursuant to the MOU in order to respond to bona fide emergencies at the specific request of established law enforcement agencies. Bonafide emergencies include, but not necessarily limited too, a serious automobile crash in the vicinity of the school, a crash that involves a child that is part of the school district, crimes encountered on his way to school, a crime in progress and the SRO is the closest unit and other situation where the public's safety is in jeopardy. The SRO so responding shall return to duty in the RSU as soon as possible. RSU #57 recognizes that the County of York has a contractual obligation to the deputy to provide him/her up to 400 hours of PTO (paid time off, actual time may vary depending on

deputies seniority) and the deputy will be absent for training purposes to maintain his law enforcement certification with the MCJA.

- E. York County shall make all decisions regarding hiring, retention and termination of the deputy subject to the selection criteria contained in the MOU.
- F. York County agrees to provide and maintain the vehicle per the manufacturers recommended maintenance schedule. The County of York further will ensure the vehicle has all of the necessary emergency equipment and communication devices. RSU #57 understands that the vehicle will be used for patrolling outside of the RSU when the SRO works overtime or has out of Town official business, to include but not limited to training and meetings.
- G. York County shall provide RSU #57 with written responses to citizen inquiries and complaints, which are directed to the York County Sheriff's Office when appropriate. Such responses shall be under the Sheriff's signature and provided within (30) thirty days of filing.
- H. The selection and hiring process shall comply with York County hiring practices as stipulated in the York County Collective Bargaining Agreement, and Policy and Procedures of the Sheriff's Department. The selection process will include representatives from RSU #57 as outlined in the MOU. However, final decisions regarding employment reside with the Sheriff.

2. REPRESENTATION OF COUNTY

York County hereby represents and acknowledges that those services described in section #1 of this agreement would not be provided through any appropriations of the annual budget of York County, in the event this agreement did not exist.

3. TERM

York County agrees to provide the service specified in this Agreement for a period commencing on the **16th day of August, 2023** and terminating on the **30th day of June, 2024**

4. COSTS

RSU #57 agrees to pay York County for each year, those estimated base amounts reflected in Addendum 1, attached hereto in and incorporated herein by reference (hereinafter referred to as the "base amount") subject to increase or decrease as provided in paragraph B below.

- A. RSU #57 shall pay the base amount in quarterly installments.
- B. The base amount is for salary, benefits and daily operational costs only. *It is understood that Capital costs for vehicle(s) are negotiated separately of this contract.* The base amount may increase or decrease depending on increases/decreases in social security, payroll accruals and/or insurance as well as increased benefits including, but not limited to any such benefits granted in any applicable collective Bargaining Agreement. Any such increases shall be paid by RSU #57 to York County following written notice/invoice thereof detailing the increase(s).

York County shall administer the payment of the deputy's salary and fringe benefits and maintain records open for inspection by RSU #57 for the duration of this agreement.
See Addendum 1 hereto and made part hereof.

5. INDEMINITY

York County shall indemnify and hold harmless RSU #57, its officers, employees, and agents from all claims, losses, damages, including property damages, personal injury, death, or other liability, directly or indirectly, arising out of the provision of SRO services set forth in this Agreement. This indemnity shall include the obligation to assume the district's defense for any claims or actions brought against the district that arise from York County's performance of SRO services under this Agreement, including, but not limited to, costs and attorney's fees. The County's indemnification obligation shall not serve to waive or alter in any way the terms, provisions, and protections contained in the Maine Tort Claims Act or any other rights that the County may have thereunder or pursuant to other applicable law. To the extent the district has insurance coverage for any claims, demands, costs, or judgment under this Agreement, the parties agree the County's coverage will be primary and the district's coverage secondary.

6. STANDARD OF PERFORMANCE

RSU #57 and York County shall attempt to mutually resolve all issues pertaining to the nature of the services and conduct of the SRO performed under this contract. Provided, however that York County shall make the final determination on said issues. York County agrees to receive and consider, in good faith, all inquiries and requests made by RSU #57. All decisions pertaining to employment discipline and discharge of personnel, performance of duties and other personnel matter shall remain exclusively with York County.

7. TERMINATION

This contract shall expire **June 30th, 2024** unless extended as set forth in Section 8 hereof

8. EXTENTION

Unless terminated by written notice to either party, the full contract shall continue in full force and effect, subject to necessary negation of any added costs and as agreed in the above provided articles for an additional period of (30) thirty days from the date of expiration

9. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This instrument, and attached addendums, embodies the entire agreement of the parties. There is no promise terms, conditions, or obligations other than those contained here; and this contract shall supersede all previous communications, representatives or agreements, either verbal or written, between the parties hereto.

This Agreement, and attached addendums, contains the entire agreement of the parties, and neither party shall be bound by any statement or representation not contained herein. No waiver shall be deemed to have been made by any of the parties unless expressed in writing and signed by the waiving party.
